



# FAQs



## “I worry about possible side effects”

- It is normal to have questions about the COVID-19 vaccine's safety
- You may have side effects after vaccination, but this is your body's expected reaction, and it means the vaccine is working
- Vaccines rarely cause long-term side effects



## “Is there enough evidence that the vaccine works?”

- All vaccines meet strict standards for safety and effectiveness
- Nearly all the people who participated in Pfizer, Moderna, and J&J's vaccine clinical trials were prevented from serious illness



## “I want to wait until more people get the vaccine”

- Widespread vaccination is critical to help stop the pandemic and reach herd immunity
- ~40% of Kansans ages +18 are fully vaccinated
- +325 million people are fully vaccinated worldwide



## “I cannot afford it”

- Vaccines are free and are becoming widely available across Kansas



## “I don't see why I need it”

- Most Kansans have said they would get a vaccine to protect loved ones and help us reach herd immunity
- People who are vaccinated can get back to doing the activities they loved before the pandemic



## “I already had COVID-19”

- Reinfection is possible, so vaccination is recommended even if a person has previously been infected with SARS-CoV-2 – the virus that causes COVID-19
- People over the age of 65 have only ~50% protection against reinfection with SARS-CoV-2
- Younger people have ~80% protection against reinfection with SARS-CoV-2 – but could spread it to others
