Vaccine Fears Overturned by Facts Webinar Series

Three Vaccine Fears Overturned by Facts webinars were hosted in March and April. Each webinar was designed for and spoke to a unique audience: health providers and educators; parents and families; and university students and faculty. Promotional efforts reached over 140k and more than 150 individuals engaged in the live webinars from across Kansas and the US.

The first two webinars featured returning guests, Heather Simpson and Lydia Greene, creators of *Back to the Vax* and co-authors of the IKC booklet, *Vaccine Fears Overturned by Facts*. Heather and Lydia shared their personal stories, notable "tropes" they once encountered as formerly anti-vaccine mothers, and how to effectively communicate with both patients and providers about concerns surrounding vaccines.

The third webinar highlighted the work of university partners through K-State Research and Extension to reach students and communities with vaccine education through on-campus campaigns, student influencers, and veterinary one-health efforts.

Infusing vaccine education and access into local life to improve vaccination equity

To strengthen relationships with community members at a local level, IKC welcomed five Community Health Specialists this fiscal year; Leonor Ramos, Lucy Watie, Marixendra Alvarez, Patricia Torres, and Yadira Soltero. These individuals are working to engage in grass root immunization education in Finney, Grant, Johnson, Sedgwick, Seward, and Wyandotte counties.

IKC's Community Health Specialists have held many local events to reach different populations and demographics, hosting booths at county events, informing at senior centers, working to educate those at local meat packing plants, and other unique educational outreach efforts. Our Community Health Specialists are immunization champions improving vaccine-equity, building relationships, and bridging the gap.


Working to Identify, Understand, and Meet Diverse Needs Surrounding Vaccinations in Southwest Kansas

Southwest Kansas is a diverse region with people from many different cultures and where many languages are spoken. About 1 in 2 (48.8%) people in this region are Hispanic or Latino. An IKC member and school nurse who lives in SW Kansas shared that over 30 languages are represented in the Finney County school system - the largest county in SW Kansas. To better understand the barriers to vaccination within these counties, bilingual IKC Community Health Specialists have engaged in grassroots educational outreach.


In Grant County, for example, CHS Lucy Watie has partnered with the local library to educate parents and caregivers during their family enrichment time and incorporates vaccine information into her ELL (English Language Learner) class. She's also seeking to respond to vaccine hesitancy within faith communities by working with spiritual leaders. To bridge the gap in access for older adults, Lucy has given presentations on immunizations at senior centers, and is working to hold adult vaccination clinics in the future.

Creating relatable digital and print materials in English and Spanish





To protect all Kansans from vaccine-preventable diseases it is essential to have educational resources in formats, languages, and cultural contexts to reach and resonate the diverse populations in our state. Translation of existing and new IKC resources into Spanish has become a top priority, while growing in our understanding of what other languages are needed as well. Digital resources - which are easily and inexpensively distributed - continue to be an important way to share information, but we have observed a clear and growing demand for print materials and in-person presentations.

During the 2022-2023 fiscal year, we were excited to release the new "Protecting Kansas with Immunizations" brochure, Kansas Fights Flu campaign toolkit for universities, Honest Conversations stories and social media toolkit, Vaccine Fears Overturned by Facts booklet and key facts handout, cards for children and adults with the list of recommended immunizations, and two new online educational modules - among many others. Looking ahead, we will continue to prioritize translation and the creation of accessible resources to ensure vaccine equity among all Kansans.

Honest Conversations

Through a grant with IDEO.org, IKC piloted the tools in the NRC-RIM Honest Conversations Toolkit to amplify immunization stories from Kansans, particularly those in refugee, immigrant, and migrant communities. Using the Honest Conversations Playbooks, IKC engaged with Latino and Hispanic communities in Southwest Kansas, Sedgwick County, and the KC Metro to identify specific vaccinations with low vaccination rates and barriers to receiving them. Once identified, the conversation began and stories were gathered from Kansans.

Featured stories and videos include Neira Calderon, a 16-year-old, and Michael Shull, D.O., talking about the HPV vaccine; Anne Zajic, a cervical cancer survivor, bringing awareness to HPV-related cancers; an anonymous 64-year-old male, sharing about the Mpox vaccine; Ismail A., a 10-year-old from Afghanistan; and Michelle Shull, RN, talking about school vaccinations.

In September, IKC attended the National Conference for Immunization Coalitions and Partners (NCICP). Building on Partnerships with K-State Research & Extension

To bring vaccine confidence to university students, IKC partnered with K-State Research and Extension (KSRE) and the K-State Office of Engagement to reach university students across the K-State campus, leading to additional conversations with family and community members about the importance of vaccination.

Outreach efforts on campus included teaching students how to engage in vaccine conversations with a module taught in select classrooms, fliers posted at campus resident halls, features on the student radio station, weekly tabling events at popular campus locations, and equipping students to be social media influencers for vaccination.

These efforts also led us to a connection with Dr. Ron Orchard, MPH, DVM, CAWA, RVT, who shared an approach to reaching community members through veterinary care for their animals. The "One Health Approach" builds a trusted relationship between animal owners and veterinarians, creating an opportunity to connect them to health resources, including human vaccination.





Protecting Immunization Policies

Advocating for policies that keep all Kansans healthy

Vaccine-related policies discussed throughout the 2023 legislative session risked placing our state's children in child care and school settings, as well as immunocompromised adults and our seniors, at a higher risk of disease, disability, or even death. At one point, some of the proposed policies also impacted both businesses and colleges and universities.

Furthermore, there were proposals to remove local and state health officials' authority to respond to infectious disease outbreaks in evidence-based fashion. Many of the vaccine-preventable diseases that our state's vaccine requirements target are also highly infectious.

Through Advocacy Day, the Legislative Reception, email, written and in-person communications, IKC and concerned citizens across Kansas called on lawmakers to reject policies that would undermine current vaccine requirements, current vaccine exemptions, or the ability to respond quickly and effectively to future infectious disease outbreaks in our state.

In addition, IKC provided resources to policy makers so they could confidently make decisions knowing vaccines are safe, effective, and protect Kansans from vaccine-preventable diseases.

As a Kansas public health pioneer once said, "The health of each of us depends on the health of all of us."



Advocacy Day and Educational Legislative Reception

We hosted our first Advocacy Day at the Capitol followed by our annual Educational Legislative Reception. The day kicked off with a recognition ceremony on the House Floor, including a statement about the importance of immunization. After the recognition, IKC Policy Chair, Heather Braum, and IKC Chair-Elect, Amanda Applegate, provided a mock role-play training on how to talk with Kansas legislators. Once prepped, IKC members and engaged partners were ready to venture over to the Capitol!



At the Capitol, IKC Staff hosted a booth providing educational resources and information. IKC members and partners met with legislators, discussing the importance of immunization, and left educational brochures for later to review. Individuals also listened to presentations from IKC and KAAP leadership, and immunization partners and advocates.

Following Advocacy Day, IKC hosted our annual Educational Legislative Reception. In attendance were 21 IKC members and partners and 13 legislators. At the end of the event, Representative John Eplee, MD, honored IKC by giving a recognition plaque to Geovannie Gone, Executive Director, for the continuous immunization work the coalition puts forth in protecting Kansans from vaccine-preventable diseases.




